Preventing Problems

Before signing the lease, make sure:

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- the place meets your needs AND your roommate needs;
- you can afford the rent;
- you clearly understand who will pay for electricity, heat, water, and garbage pick-up; and
- you inspect the place and note in writing any problems.

Use the Inventory and Condition Report when you inspect the place. Ask your landlord to be there and have them sign your notes. Take pictures of any damage.

Save documents or copies of documents

- If you want to be able to prove that you paid rent on time, you should get a receipt to show complete and timely payment of rent.
- If you want to be able to prove that you requested repairs, you should ask for repairs in writing and keep copies of your letters.
- If you want to be able to prove that you sent something to your landlord on a certain date, you should get a certificate of mailing from the post office (different than certified mail).
- Keeping a signed copy of your rental agreement will help you to prove in court what it is that you and your landlord agreed to.

Know your rights

Landlords have a responsibility to ensure that the housing unit fits requirements of habitability. Find those here:

Communicate effectively

At all times be sure you communicate politely, concisely, and clearly. See DIY: Challenges in Written Communication for more tips.

Initial requests to your landlord can be communicated however is the norm for you both – whether that's emails, texts or phone calls. If they don't respond to you in a reasonable time, you should move to more formal communication, US mail. Keep copies (or pictures) of your letters, these records are useful if there is a dispute. Oregon Law Help has a list of helpful form letters you can use to address problems.
